Analysis of Feedback (2017-2018)

The feedback for the year 2017-18 was analysed and the observations have been stated below.

The continuous analysis of the teaching and learning process with the help of students' and parents' feedback facilitates the teachers and the college to improve the knowledge, skills and the quality of the education. The college periodically solicits feedback from students of all the courses and from the parents, regarding teachers, college and the office staff. Feedback based on seventeen broad factors, was taken for the year 2014-15 to acquaint with the opinion of the students regarding teachers, college campus, infrastructural facilities, college atmosphere, quality of teaching staff and the position of the college in the region.

- 1) Regarding the syllabus of each course:
99% of the students were of the opinion that the syllabus of each course was adequate and challenging.
- 2) Background for benefiting from the course:
85% of the students were of the opinion that the background for benefiting from the course was adequate.
- 3) Course easy or difficult?
93% of the students were of the opinion that the course was easy and manageable.
- 4) Syllabus covered in class:
92% students were of the opinion that 100% of the syllabus was covered in the class.
- 5) Students' opinion regarding Library material and facilities for the course:
87% students were of the opinion that the library material and facilities for the course are adequate and more than adequate.
- 6) Extent of ability to get material for prescribed readings:
86% students were of the opinion that they could get material for prescribed readings easily.
- 7) Teacher's preparation for the classes:
100% students were of the opinion that the teacher was thoroughly prepared for the classes.
- 8) Teacher's ability to communicate:
98% students were of the opinion that the teacher's ability to communicate was always effective.
- 9) Teacher's encouragement of student participation in class:
100% students were of the opinion that the teachers encourage student participation in the class.
- 10) Method used by the teacher for above:
93% students expressed their views that teachers always encourage students to raise questions and get involved in discussion in class.

- 11) Teacher's helpfulness in advising:
92% students from all faculties were of the opinion that teachers are very helpful in advising them to generate interest in the subject.
- 12) Teacher's approach:
100% students said that the teacher's approach is always courteous.
- 13) Internal assessment:
95% students from all faculties were of the opinion that internal assessment was always fair.
- 14) Effect of Internal Assessment on course grade:
93% students from all faculties said that internal assessment is helpful for improvement.
- 15) Frequency of feedback on performance by teachers:
98% students were of the opinion that feedback on performance was provided regularly and with helpful comments.
- 16) Discussion of assignments with students:
93% students were of the opinion that assignments were discussed fully and 5% said that assignments were discussed partly.
- 17) Providing a course contributory lecture at the beginning:
85% students from all faculties confirmed that the course contributory lectures were provided at the beginning.

Best Practice – I

1) Title of the practice :

"Savitribai Fule Adarsh Palak Puraskar"

2) Goals and Objectives :

- i) This award is given to especially the parents of girl students.
- ii) To felicitate those parents who adhere girls' education.
- iii) To motivate the parents of girls students for higher education.
- iv) To ease gender discrimination in higher education.
- v) To give financial assistance to deprived girls students.
- vi) To raise the enrolment of girls students.

3) The Context :

In 21st century women have shown their ability in all fields. In some important fields women have proved their power of work done successfully. We know that women are not weak in any field. However in some region the people are not willing for girls birth. The crime of 'Female Foeticide' is committed not only by uneducated and poor people but also by well educated people in society. Even today some parents are not willing to send their daughters in colleges for higher education.

Taking this view in consideration our college has started 'Savitribai Fule Adarsh Palak Puraskar' from 2014 by the name of 'Savitribai Fule', Which is given to the parents who adhere girls education. This helps to increase the enrolment of girls and to ease gender discrimination.

The award is given on 3rd January of every year on the birth anniversary of the pioneer of girls education, Savitribai Fule to the parents who educate their daughter in a very holistic condition without any view of gender discrimination.

A cheque of Rs. 2001/- and citation is a nature of this award.

4) The practice :

In rural area the parents are not willing to promote their daughter for higher education rather than their sons. Most of the girls incomplete their education and leave the college. A very few percent of girls complete their graduation. The college strive to change the mindset of the people in the area that they should adhere their daughter to complete their higher education and becomes graduate and post graduate. The college has taken initiative by starting 'Savitribai Fule Adarsh Palak Puraskar' in

2014-15. The college selection committee select parent of college girls student for the award who adhere their daughters for higher education without any view of gender discrimination. Rs. 2001/- and citation is a nature of the award. This helps to boost the parents in the region to enhance the percentage of admission of girls students to higher education.

5) Evidence of Success :

In order to make awareness among the parents in local area about the girls higher education and to motivate the parents to admit their daughter in the college for their higher education, the college has started the award.

Felicitation of such parents who adhere girl's education without keeping any view of gender discrimination boost the parents for girl's higher education. The practice helps to motivate such parents even in their holistic condition. It raises the enrollment percentage of girls than boys. It consequences that the passing percentage of girls is higher than boys. Meritorious percentage of girls is also higher than boys. The girls in the nearby villages complete their graduation and secure their post graduation studies too. Most of the girls in the region can be graduate and self reliant because of short term courses.

6) Problems Encountered and Resources Required :

Most of the parents in the region adhere son's education rather than their daughters. They have unawareness about girls higher education so they are not willing to permit their daughter for their higher studies. They made their mindset that the expenditure on girls education is in vain. They promote only boys to education and secure their employment. They feel that 'Hearth & Child' is the only field of girls. Because of this initiative the college tried to make aware the parents about girls education. Felicitation becomes motivation to them and they permitted their daughters to secure their admission and complete their higher education. A good message spread among the society of girls education. Now the girls can complete their education and make self reliant without any hurdles.

7) Notes :

To felicitate the parents in the region by 'Savitribai Fule Adarsh Palak Puraskar' is the best practice run by the institution from 2014. The practice boosts the parents to adhere girls education. Because of this most of the girls can take admission in the institution and complete their higher education. It eases gender discrimination. Because of this practice the institution is awarded by higher and technical education

department of Maharashtra in 2014 under the campaign of 'Jagar Janivancha' for the institution that motivate the girls for their higher education and ease gender discrimination and that treat the girls and boys equally in imparting the education.

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Best Practice – II

1) Title of the Practice :

"Bicycle Training Programme for Girls Students"

2) Goal & Objectives :

- i) To make convenient conveyance of girls students from remote places.
- ii) To make girls physically strong.
- iii) To train the girls students for pollution free bicycle driving.
- iv) To make financially free conveyance of girls students.
- v) To empower girls by giving them bicycle training.
- vi) To make girls economically empower by saving their conveyance expenditure.
- vii) To ease the hurdles of conveyance for on-time presence of students for class lectures.
- viii) To raise the attendance of girls students in the college.

3) The Context :

The institution is located at rural area. Most of the students are coming from nearby villages. Some villages are situated at remote places. Bus transportation is not available at some villages. There is a big problem occur in students conveyance to the college. Most of the girls remain absent to the college because of non availability of transportation. This is a big hurdle occur in taking higher education. To overcome this hurdle, the college took initiative by starting bicycle training programme for girls students. The alumni students took a vital role for this training programme. The girls lived in remote villages come in the college by bicycle on time and attend the classes regularly. They acquired the skill of cycle driving. They may be self reliant by achieving this skill for self employment.

4) The practice :

The college is located in rural area. It is surrounded by small villages. Some villages are in remote places. The people from such places and especially girls are deprived from educational facilities, medical help and their daily business (market need). To meet their educational need the college has started the bicycle training programme for girls students so that they easily approach to the college to seek their higher education by overcoming the problem of conveyance, they come on time for their regular classes. They can drive cycle and secure medical help and facilitate themselves by their business hunt also. In order to make women capable to meet their educational, medical and business needs. The practice run by the college proved to be

a best practice by giving bicycle training to girls students. The co-ordinator select trained girls at least five from each class and they give the training to other untrained girls. The untrained girls, who wish to give training come forward for training and co-ordinator makes groups to decide the schedule of training as per their convenient time and get trained. The parents feel happy for the practice run by the college.

5) Evidence of success :

The college has started this best practice in order to ease the problem of conveyance of girls students coming from remote places to the college from the session 2016-17. In the session there are near about 36 girls and in the session 2017-18, near about 40 girls got advantage of this training programme. They come to the college by their own bicycle. They overcome the problem of conveyance, caused by the unavailability of the buses. They are now become capable for doing their own work related to irregular transportation.

The college found good result of girls regular attendance to the college. They can enjoy pollution free and money free transportation.

6) Problems Encountered and Resources Required :

Because of driving fear the low response of girls students and raising funds for buying bicycles are the problems occurred in the beginning. The faculty of the college counsel the girls and console the importance of the training programme gradually the students admits the importance of training and becomes ready for the training without any fear and a good response come from the students.

The alumni of the college provided the funds for buying bicycles from their funds generated by them. In the 1st year (2016-17) two bicycles and in the 2nd year (2017-18) two bicycles were bought. Initially the trainers are not available to train the girls but there were some trained girls came forward and became ready to give the training to their friends. In this way the problems encountered initially overcome and the practise became the best practice and made the girls capable for driving bicycles.

7) Notes :

The society surrounded the college views that the girls are weaker than the boys students. They are not as capable as boys to do hard works. The parents believes in gender discrimination. But the college imparts the higher education equally to both boys and girls without any gender discriminative view. Empowerment of women is the main extension activity run by the college. The college always endeavour for women empowerment. Many regular activities organized by the college for the

empowerment, equality and education of women. Gender discrimination is a hazardous practice in the society. The college beside imparting higher education taking care about the upliftments of the girls. In order to empower the girls physically, economically, socially, educationally strong. The practice 'The Bicycle Training Programme' for girls students proved to be a best practice.
